Because of this resolution, RAEA can now finalize the revision of our Constitution and Manual, which we hope to have completed and approved by our membership at our Business Meeting at the convention.

RAEA AWARDS

I am happy to announce that **Donna Anderson** has been named the **2025 RAEA National Emeritus Art Educator** and will be honored at our awards session on **Saturday, March 22, 2025 from 4:00 PM-4:50 PM at the Kentucky International Convention Center at the Louisville NAEA** convention. Donna has an MS in Art Education from the University of Tennessee, where she studied printmaking with Byron McKeeby. Her undergraduate work was done at Middle Tennessee State University with printmaker Larry Brooks. As an art teacher in Knox County Schools for more than 40 years, she covered all types of printmaking in her classes.

Donna has won numerous awards over her career, including Knox County Teacher of the Year for 1997, Tennessee Art Educator of the Year for 2003, National Secondary Art Educator for 2008, Tennessee Art Education Association Distinguished Service within the Profession Award for 2019, and the Joe W. Giles Lifetime Achievement Award for 2019. She has traveled to Japan as a Fulbright Memorial Teacher Scholar and as a Fulbright Scholar to Egypt and Israel. Donna served as the president of the Tennessee Art Education Association from 2013 to 2015 and received the 2022 Tennessee Emeritus Art Educator of the Year Award.



Donna is also the author of *Experience Printmaking*, published by Davis Publications. She shared content from this textbook recently in an episode on Practical Printmaking for the K12 Art Chat podcast.

Donna and Flowerree McDonough have been co-editors of **RAEA's** award winning Emeritus E-Bulletin since 2020.

Kathryn Hillyer 2025 RAEA Distinguished Service Award

Also to be honored at the convention is **Kathryn Hillyer**, **a past president of RAEA and the recipient of the 2025 RAEA Distinguished Service Award.** Kathryn Hillyer's first teaching position began in 1976 in Deerfield District 109 where she taught for 37 years. Kathryn's career has been highlighted with incredible leadership roles that have helped shape the field of art education. She has been extensively involved in IAEA as President, Student Show Coordinator, Conference Coordinator, and as a frequent conference presenter. She has been awarded the IAEA Elementary Art Educator of the Year in 1994, IAEA Distinguished Member in 2005, and also received the IAEA Presidents Award in 2006.

Beyond IAEA, Kathryn has served as **NAEA Western Region Vice President,** Illinois Arts Alliance of Arts Education board member, and worked with the Illinois State Board of Education as a member of the content standards, assessment, and writing teams. Kathryn also taught art methods classes North Park University for six years while continuing to teach full time in Deerfield.

Kathryn served as RAEA President during Covid so she never was able to preside at an inperson convention! She has been a NAEF (National Art Education Foundation) Trustee since 2018 and is also the NAEF liaison to the NAEA Research Commission. For NAEF she has reviewed convention proposals and worked on the Research Commission Pre-Conference. For NAEA she has served as chair for the Nomination committee for Regional VPs and President-Elect as well as a member of the 2016 Divisional Directors Nominating Committee.

In addition, since she retired from her elementary teaching position, she worked for Illinois State University, working with preservice art educators until she moved to Wisconsin at the end of 2022.

Other Recognition and Awards

In November Melody received the 2025 Tennessee Art Educator of the Year Award from TAEA. It was presented to her by her TAEA colleague and friend James M. Wells for her years of service and dedication not only to her state organization but to the field of art education. Then in December, Melody learned that she was also selected as the 2025 NAEA Southeastern Region Art Educator of the Year. That award will be presented to her at the NAEA Convention in Louisville this Spring.

In the Spotlight

Hello fellow Art Education Retirees! My name is Cheryl Maney. You may recognize me from my two stints on the NAEA Board. One as Supervision and Administration Division Director and the most recent one as the Southeastern Vice President. (I was a lot less silver when a director!) I also served in numerous positions on the North Carolina Art Education Association's board, lead writer for the NC Art Standards, and writing committee member for the National Visual Arts Standards.

I served 33 years in the public school system here in North Carolina teaching all ages, but primarily elementary. Other roles have included Arts Integration Specialist, Director of Spectrum of the Arts, Mid-Carolina Region Affiliate for Scholastics Art and Writing Awards, and the Visual Arts, Media Arts, and Dance Curriculum Specialist for the 14th largest school district in the nation. Under my supervision, my district was one of the first to publish a Middle and High School Curriculum Handbook for the Digital Media Arts Department I established.

After retiring in 2022, I could not stay still very long. As national consultant for Davis Art Publications, I have traveled to many districts to provide professional development for teachers. This was my favorite part of my previous role, providing quality resources and instructional development for art teachers. It thrills me when I see teachers learning new information about art education which they use to turn students on to the power of art in our lives.

The benefits from joining the county arts guild have been three-fold: teaching art classes for adults; taking classes from local artists; and increasing my participation in gallery exhibits. The classes have sparked my joy in creating and 'lubricated' my petrified skills. Exhibiting has made me more diligent in returning to the studio. As a previous architecture major, I've always been fascinated with the art and engineering of sculptural book forms. Retirement has given me a little time to delve into making the books and then melding in my photographs.

When I was teaching, I really enjoyed opening the students' eyes to the variety in the world, both through nature and different communities and cultures. I was fortunate to participate in several educational excursions, such as Cuba with NAEA and Guatemala as a World Affairs Scholar; take students to New York

and New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina; and personally travel. I have taken thousands of photographs of landscapes and artists making. I find photographs capture moments in time, making visible a second that many overlook. I try not to alter my photographs other than cropping, zeroing in to the macro and spiking curiosity in the abstract. It's my way of staying present in my environment and out of my head.

Retired Art Educator and RAEA Silent Auction Chair **Melody** Weintraub was honored January 2-31, 2025, with a retrospective exhibition of her artwork (1983-2024), My Story in Light and Shadows, at WKNO Digital Studios in Cordova, Tennessee, and online at Gallery Ten Ninety One. WKNO is the National Public Radio and Public Television Affiliate in the Memphis area. A portion of her proceeds will directly benefit WKNO's programming. Melody was approached to present her work after one of her paintings was selected in a juried show earlier in the year. Her work, "My Story in Light and Shadows," featured over 30 paintings in watercolor, acrylic and mixed media.



My Story in Light and Shadows Artist Statement by Melody Weintraub



It has been said that every picture tells a story. As I reflect on what I choose to paint, I have

found that it's almost always connected to a story. Some of the stories are imaginary while others are based on memories. Playing in my grandfather's barn in southeastern Texas with my cousins and later the barn became a backdrop for a host of family reunions. The "Narcissus Waiting" was inspired when I noticed how those dainty flowers were growing in a line in my mother's garden, while facing different directions as if they were waiting for a city bus. A sunny day at an old market in the Cotswolds in November a year ago, set light and shadows on 400 year old textured stones and rafters inspiring a painting when we returned.

I am grateful to God for the role that the arts have played in shaping my life. Having spent my career in education, I have seen the arts ignite a spark in young lives giving students a sense of purpose. That is a story within a story of light and shadows. I once asked my students to write a paragraph on "Why Art Matters to Me." One essay stood out most to me. It was written by an 8th grade girl. "Art matters to me because, without art, there would be no way to express myself, no way of communication. It would be like stitching my mouth together, forcing me to stay trapped in my own body screaming out for someone to let me out...Because with art, I am free, I am safe, and I don't have to feel the weight of the world alone."

Art matters to me because art is the place I also go to reflect on the people, places and nature around me. It is where I find solace in allowing the canvas to do the storytelling. Hopefully you will find your own story within my story of light and shadows.
