
Latonya Hicks

A mixed-media artist, she works with found, gifted, and discarded objects to transform fragments of cultural and personal history into layered visual stories.

For Latonya, artmaking is a form of archaeology—unearthing, preserving, and reimagining. Her current series is deeply personal, marking a new chapter in her life as a Black woman without family historians to consult and with motherhood no longer in view. These works speak of memory, resilience, and legacy.

By day, Latonya serves as secondary visual arts coordinator for Pinellas County Schools, where she shapes the secondary curriculum, mentors teachers, and champions the arts. A graduate of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts University, she also leads on state- and national-level platforms as President of the Florida Art Education Association and as a mentor, reader, consultant, and Development Committee member for AP Art & Design.


