


Trivia

Question: Who created and patented a self-pasting scrapbook in 1872? The book contained adhesive in a grid pattern that was already on each page.

While the exact "first ever" scrapbook artist is difficult to pinpoint, several sources cite **Mark Twain** as a prominent figure in the history of scrapbooking. He was known for his extensive travels and for creating and patenting a self-pasting scrapbook in 1872, which simplified the process of assembling scrapbook pages. Other early scrapbookers include individuals who filled common place books with various items and those who created friendship albums in the Victorian era.

In The Spotlight

Cris Guenter, Ed.D.

Past Chair, National Art Education Foundation, 2025 NAEA Convention Program Coordinator - San Diego President, CAEA, (California) NAEA Vice President - Pacific Region Outstanding Teacher at Chico State NAEA 2008 National Art Educator of the Year

I am **Cris Guenter**, a native of Pennsylvania and a lifelong artist and art educator. I grew up in the rural Allegheny Mountains of McKean County, where my father served as the local doctor. He often made house calls, and one of my siblings or I would go along. While waiting in the car, even as a young child, I passed the time by sketching barns, bridges, and the surrounding landscape.

After earning degrees in painting and art education from Penn State, I began teaching art to grades 7–12 in Clarion, PA—a job I considered a dream come true. I later pursued my master's and doctorate degrees at the University of Wyoming. During my time in Laramie, I also managed the University Art Gallery and taught a graduate course in gallery management. I then worked for a year as a gifted and talented teacher and coordinator in Green River, WY, before being hired by California State University, Chico to prepare future teachers. I spent 32 years at Chico State, as it's affectionately known, and retired in the fall of 2019, just before the pandemic. However, my teaching didn't stop there—I now teach art classes during the fall, winter, and spring through the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Chico State.

I joined the National Art Education Association (NAEA) in 1975 as a student teacher at Penn State and have remained active ever since. After moving to Chico in 1987, I became President of the Northern Area of the California Art Education Association and chaired Chico's first Arts Commission, where I helped establish the city's public art protocols and acquisition processes. Protocols and acquisition processes. I also oversaw the 1996 updates to California's statewide K–12 visual and performing arts curriculum, including incorporating technology standards.



I later served as President of the California Art Education Association and as NAEA Pacific Region Vice President.
In 2014, I was the NAEA Convention Program Coordinator for the San Diego conference, which emphasized technology in art education. Since 2018, I've been a trustee of the National Art Education Foundation and currently serve as its past chair.

Throughout my teaching career, I have continued to create and exhibit my own art. My work is primarily two-dimensional—painting (in oils and watercolor), drawing, printmaking, and photography—featuring work in both traditional materials and some with digital elements. I still draw inspiration from local scenes, just as I did as a child. Currently, I have three pieces on display at the Museum of Northern California Art (monca). For 35 years, I have participated in the Chico Art Center's annual Open Studios Art Tour, a two-weekend event in October showcasing around 70 local artists and their workspaces and am looking forward to it again this year.


AENJ Distinguished Fellow Announcement
