Museum Information:

Major Art Museums (Classic & Contemporary)

- The Art Institute of Chicago: A world-renowned institution with art spanning centuries, including famous Impressionist and Post-Impressionist works, located at 111 S. Michigan Ave, near Millennium Park. (14-minute walk from the Hyatt Regency)
- Museum of Contemporary Art (MCA) Chicago: Focuses on art from 1945 to the present, featuring rotating exhibitions, a sculpture garden, and a great location at 220 E. Chicago Ave, just off the Magnificent Mile. (19-minute walk from the Hyatt Regency)

Immersive & Interactive Art Experiences

- Color Factory: An interactive, colorful experience with 14 immersive exhibits, located in the Willis Tower (233 S. Wacker Dr.). (30-minute walk)
- WNDR Museum: An immersive, sensory art experience with interactive exhibits and photo opportunities, located in the West Loop area. (This one is a bit further, but worth it—13 minutes by car, 32 by public transportation, or a 52-minute walk)
- Museum of Illusions Chicago: Offers visual, sensory, and educational illusions with classic and unique exhibits. (14-minute walk) Open until 9pm Friday and Saturday!

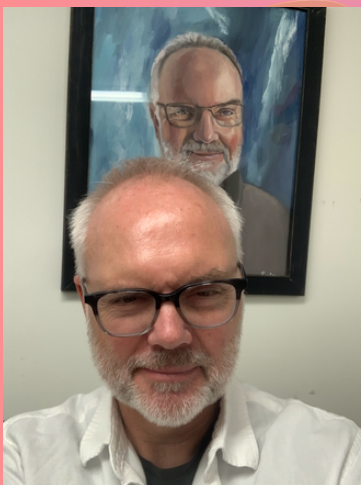

I wish my students understood that art is not just a series of projects but more about building ideas and techniques to share a story or express emotion.

My favorite thing about art class is the relationships—always the relationships. I love watching students figure out who they are (sometimes quietly, sometimes dramatically) while sitting next to someone doing the same thing. Art class becomes this rare space where it's safe to try, fail, change your mind, and still belong. It's where quiet students find a voice, bold students learn to listen, and everyone realizes their ideas matter—even when there's paint on their hands and glue on the table. The art is important, sure—but the becoming, the connections, reflection and those small breakthrough moments? That's the real magic!!

Eligibility

- Submitters must be a sponsor of a registered NAHS/NJAHS chapter with a current NAEA membership.
- Student must be a member of a registered NAHS/NJAHS chapter for the **current school year**.

Submission Details

- Submissions must be made digitally through the submission portal **by the chapter sponsor**.
- Limit **ONE** entry per student. [Multiple submissions for the same student will be disqualified from jurying].
- ALL submissions must be an original piece by the student, if proven otherwise, the student will be disqualified.
- Each submission must be accompanied by an Artist's Statement: In 50 words or less, the student should describe their creative process, what inspired this artwork, or why they believe that art matters.
- Images of work must be submitted as JPEG or PNG at a minimum of 540 px.
